The Tribe decided to host their own celebration on October 10th, 2022 in honor of the newly established National day to recognize Indigenous Peoples, announced by President Joe Biden in 2021. With planning beginning at the end of August, the tribe was able to hire emcee Cody Poqueno, arrange for Murkowski's rural staff Cordelia Kelly, Meghan Topkok, coordinate a fashion show, dance performances by King Island and St. Lawrence Island Dance Groups, with the end of the night concluding with a Byron Nicholai performance. Hosted at the Rec Center in Nome, facilitators welcomed potluck style foods and began the opening prayer around 5:30. Hundreds of local Nome residents attended to celebrate the milestones and culture of the people residing in the Bering Strait Region. President Kirsten Timbers did a tribal recognition of attendees throughout the gym. The Fashion show consisted of anyone brave enough to

walk down the red carpet showing off their favorite kuspuk, mukluks, parkas, jewelry, etc.

The tribe hopes to host or assist coordinating efforts on an annual basis. More photos on last page.

#### 2022-2023 At A Glance

The Village of Solomon has concluded another very exciting year! We have for the twelfth year in a row held our tribal youth spirit camp however, We are so thrilled we can do it in person this year. Although the pandemic has slowed down for now we do still offer COVID assistance for utilities and internet.

#### **Typhoon Merbock**

Merbock wrecked havoc on our region on September 17. This included significant damages not only in Nome but washed out the Nome – Solomon HWY at mile 23 photographed below. Many people experienced damage to their cabins, boats and other property. Fortunately Knik Construction was already in



Nome with all their equipment from another project and was able to repair the road. The road damage included washout and beachwood being pushed up onto the road between the Bonanza Bridge and Solomon. Fortunately that has all been cleaned up and repaired and before snowfall everyone could safely travel to Solomon again.

#### **Membership Benefits**

VOS is continuing to promote more Family, Cultural, Recreational, and Social Wellness Choices by purchasing personal wellness items for tribal members on a reimbursement basis. We are also supporting our local hunters and gatherers in sharing traditional foods such as fish and game with others within our tribal membership. Through our hunter support agreement, the program will allow for support funds to purchase gas and other supplies up to \$250 (excluding ammo) to hunt/gather for our tribal membership and their families who cannot harvest traditional foods on their own. We also cover part of the cost of bed bug extermination on an on going and regular basis. Additionally, VOS is providing back to school supplies to students. This is a reimbursable benefit and the items purchased must be included on the back to school list provided by the school or otherwise approved by VOS. We also offer \$500 for bereavement assistance for the death of a tribally enrolled member and Emergency Assistance on a one time basis for help with rent/mortgage, assistance with airfare for medical emergency of death of an immediate family member. We are excited to begin offering this new service to our tribal members.

#### Affordable Housing

We have also developed an Affordable Housing Plan to provide new housing, down payment assistance and housing renovation as benefits to our tribal members with our ARPA funds.

#### **Tribal Court**

We are in the process of setting up our own tribal court. We are receiving technical support from Kawerak's legal team. Our court will be able to handle civil matters and select other cases.

#### **IPOP Mining Update**

Solomon engaged in three government to government consultations with The Army Corps of Engineers regarding IPOP mining in the Bonanza Channel With the steadfast work of our tribal council, partnership with SNC and most notably Deilah's fervent passion IPOP their permit was officially denied on September 9. "Based on the presence of seasonal fish camps information received in response to the public notices and during Tribal consultations,[...] the Corps has determined that the proposed project would directly impact subsistence users and resources – specifically fish, birds and other animals within the range of noise disturbance from the operations." Col. Delarosa.

#### **Bed and Breakfast Update**

B&B was open for a handful of reservations this year despite the pandemic and booking rooms can be done online. The exterior of the cabin was repainted last season as well as several windows were replaced. We have a new playground set and the last of the gravel should have been delivered this past week. 

Wilma is working on completing the Business Plan for the B&B and once completed and approved, she will apply for the EDA Grant to implement the plan in order to enhance the business to be a leading rural B&B throughout Indian Nations.

Wilma had her first open B&B season, where she learned how to read maintenance issues, do check-ins, reservations, check-outs and cleaning the B&B. VOS had to cancel the reservation we had booked when Typhoon Merbock hit and washed out the road. The storm caused us to close earlier then originally planned. The renovations that were going to be done in October 2022 had also been canceled.

# Environmental Coordinator Report

The Environmental Dept. has concluded their partnership with the Army Corp of Engineers, for their habitat study within the Solomon watershed. The report should become available in the early months of 2023. Due to the impacts of Merbok, two sampling trips to Solomon had been cancelled for the Biologist. However, Chris Hoffman, the biologist had been able to sample at least 8 other times for data collection, including eDNA sampling.

I was able to attend the first and second ARENA trips, the first was to Fairbanks and ending in Kotzebue, mid July. Due to an outbreak of COVID, the trip was cut 2 days short. At the end of October, we traveled to Reykjavik, Iceland. We had full schedules, tours and presentations during both trips. The insights during the tours, the knowledge sharing, networking, collaborating ideas for cold climates and solving energy challenges as a cohort has been the



most amazing experience. Our cohort is primarily Canadian, however, the similarities are so aligned. The cohort's participants are diverse, yet, the same. We could discuss energy all day together, which made the experience that much more impactful.

We have now been under an EPA building capacity grant for a decade. Throughout this decade, we have been able to support opposing IPOP with our water quality component, develop and implement our renewable and alternative energy for our tribe and provide outreach, tips and education to our community.



### **Development Coordinator Report**

The office has been managing their CDC grant which provides support for internet and utility support to households that apply. The grant will be closed out by June 2023, after the 2nd extension for the grant.

The Council has been spearheading the Affordable Housing Plan, which has required more grant writing than anticipated. The tribe will be following the LEDP's priority list moving forward with an emphasis on the Affordable Housing and Tribal Court initiatives.

We have received a Denali Commission grant for our Land purchase/utility expansion. We are seeking additional funding to support the utility and construction.

The tribe will continue to seek funds to host youth camp each year

#### THE PERFECT CINNAMON ROLLS

#### Ingredients

1 1/2 tablespoons Active Dry Yeast

1 1/2 tablespoons granulated sugar

1/2 cup warm water 115 degrees F.

8 tablespoons 1stick unsalted melted butter

3/4 cup warmed whole milk or heavy cream 115 degrees F.

3/4 cup granulated sugar

1 large egg

4 cups All-Purpose flour plus more for dusting counters

1 teaspoon kosher salt

#### Cinnamon/Sugar Layer

8 tablespoons 1stick unsalted softened butter

1 cup packed light brown sugar

1/2 cup granulated sugar

3 tablespoons ground cinnamon

4 tablespoons softened unsalted butter for buttering pan

1/4 cup packed light brown sugar for sprinkling over buttered pan

#### Frosting

8 ounces softened cream cheese

8 tablespoons 1 stick softened unsalted butter

2-3 cups powdered sugar

#### Instructions

Place yeast and sugar into stand mixer then add warm water and gently stir. Let sit until yeast has doubled, about 10 minutes. In a medium bowl, mix melted butter and warm milk. Add butter and milk mixture to yeast mixture with the dough hook attachment on low speed then add sugar and egg mixing until combined. In a large bowl, stir together the flour and salt.

Add 2 cups of flour mixture to the mixer at a time scraping sides of bowl, continuing to add remaining flour until the dough starts to clean sides of mixing bowl. Kneed dough on low speed for 7 minutes. Place dough onto a floured counter and kneed dough until it does not stick to your hands. Place dough into a large bowl that has been sprayed with cooking spray. Cover with a damp cloth and let rise in a barely warm oven for 45-60

minutes, until dough doubles in size.

Remove dough from bowl and place onto a floured counter top. With a floured rolling pin, roll dough into an approximate 14x24 inch rectangle, about 1/4 inch in thickness. Spread softened butter over entire surface of dough. In a medium mixing bowl, stir together the brown sugar, sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle evenly over buttered dough. Starting at long end of dough, carefully roll into a log shape. Using dental floss or knife, cut rolls into 1 1/2 inch pieces.

Take 4 tablespoons softened butter and spread on bottom of 9x13 inch pan then sprinkle with brown sugar. Place 4 rolls per row close to each other, about 1/2 inch apart. Place into a barely warm oven (turn oven to warm for 5 minutes, then turn off right before placing rolls in oven to let rise) for 45-60 minutes or until rolls have doubled in size. Remove rolls from oven and preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Bake rolls for 15-17 minutes or until rolls are golden brown and baked through. Set aside to cool slightly.

Place cream cheese and butter into your clean stand mixer bowl and beat until smooth and combined. Slowly add powdered sugar until desired consistency is achieved. I prefer 2-3 cups. Spread cream cheese frosting over warm rolls. Serve warm or let cool and enjoy room temperature. If serving the next day refrigerate then warm in the microwave individual rolls for 10-15 seconds in the microwave

#### COVID RELIEF SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE COUNCIL MANAGED THROUGH THE OFFICE

On August 20th, 2020 the Traditional Council approved Resolution 2020-05, declaring a Public Health Emergency in response to the Coronavirus Pandemic. Since the resolution was approved and passed, the Tribe has had the ability to provide all membership with covid relief services using the CARES Act Funds, Grants from various funding agencies and the new American Rescue Plan Act funding to mitigate the direct affects of the coronavirus and any variant of covid19 to the VOS tribal community.

#### **CURRENT COVID RELIEF APPLICATIONS TO SUPPORT MEMBERSHIP**

**INTERNET SUPPORT** - to provide financial assistance for the high cost of internet services per household on a monthly basis

**UTILITY ASSISTANCE** - to provide financial assistance for the high cost of UTILITIES per household on a monthly basis

**LAPTOP** - You may apply for a chromebook online due to a more virtual world during the pandemic

Housing Strategic Program Plan Update

The Council has approved their first Affordable Housing Strategic Plan. With components to assist tribal members in acquiring affordable housing initiatives. Currently, their focus has been on the new construction development on the East side of Nome. Constructing 3 single family homes and a new Community Center. Due to the undeveloped location of the east end of town, the utilities do not have lines reaching this area. The Tribe has diligently been working toward expanding the utility lines, partnered with the King Island Native Community and building a resource network to support the expansion prior to placing the new homes on the new gravel pads. The construction plans are tentative for Fall 2023. Occupancy applications will be made available as soon as possible. All housing updates, applications and forms will be announced on the Village of Solomon website.
